

"P.S.: Don't forget to fly alang th' groon."






254 POUND KITE, THE EIPPER-FORMANCE QUICKSILVER MX ULTRALIGHT AIRCRAFT


forms of natural and artificial flight in and beyond the ambient atmosphere.

Read on; Dave's vision was pre-vision:


". . . The August DL arrived on 30 July. As I've always been geometrically inclined, I especially enjoyed the last two DL's (happy,

happy).

. . . To update you on my aerial antics, I v ' have completed my radio control picture taking contraption. . . . Everything worked to perfection until I let my sister (Joan-ie-You've probably seen her name mentioned in Tight Lines) give it a try. Even with her help I managed to take 38 pictures. If I hadn't had to take the camera down to change film, I could have taken those shots in about a minute-and-a-half! . . . Sometimes I'm so clever I scare myself. As the radio control unit is now, I can fire the shutter and aim the camera in the azimuthal plane up to 45° in either direction from any chosen datum angle-from up to a mile-and-a-half away. . . The farthest I've tried it has been about 1,000 yards through houses and other assorted [radiation] clutter.

". . . So that's what's up in Sea Isle City. Looking forward to the next DL. . . First week of Trolldom and loving it!—Dave Town."

FRANK L. LIESE of Lakehurst, NJ says this: "Data Letter of September 1982 [#22] was very helpful in revealing to me the maker (Captive Flight Devices of Abington, Pennsylvania) of the Captive Model Autogyro.

"I believe I have one of the original autogyro kites, which I purchased about 1935.

"Your rotor kite designer did an excellent job by scaling photo illustrations of the Captive Model Autogyro [Kite Tales, Spring '72]. However, the one I have has a 0.380" wide spruce leading edge, with balsa trailing edge attached. Also, it has no spruce spar or balsa fin tips at the front of the fuselage.


"Presently, my gyro kite is on display at the Port of History Museum at Penn's Landing, Philadelphia, June 17th through September 15th, for observation by other kite flyers.

"You may recall I donated an antique autogyro kite to the Smithsonian Institution (as was mentioned in the April 1982 Data Letter). It had three blades on the rotor. I am somewhat disappointed that they have not displayed it for the benefit of other kiteflyers."
