

The goldfish design features opal and transparent glass in conjunction with mirrored antique glass. The halogen light bulbs can be changed by taking away the prisms. When creating an artwork of stained glass, four aspects of light have to be taken into account:

Stained glasswork seen from inside the building during daylight, inside after dusk, outside the building in daylight, and outside in the evening.

Breidfjord already has a lifetime's worth of projects under his belt. His stained glass windows, both large and small, can be found in almost two dozen churches all over Iceland, as well as in churches in Germany and Scotland. St. Giles' in Edinburgh, the cathedral of Scottish Protestants, is perhaps the most famous example of his work. Another dozen of his windows grace banks, schools, and other public buildings in Iceland, including two architectural landmarks of recent origin: the National Library building and the newly inaugurated Supreme Court building. Recently, Breidfjord was commissioned to execute a stained glass window for a Reykjavik building of political rather than architectural consequence. The joint Anglo-German Embassy building is the only one of its kind in the world. Breidfjord also has provided his share of stained glass windows for private houses and collectors.

A free-hanging stained glass kite designed to evoke joy and happiness. A combination of opal and opaque white glass and transparent glass offer a play of graphic tex-tures and lines. The piece can be installed in different positions.



Two free-hanging stained glass kites designed to harmonize with the frame structure of the architecture. Opal and opaque glass are used in contrast with transparent glass.

The outside view of this window is as important as the inside view. The window is made of mostly opaque glass and opal-opaque white glass shading into clear glass. It shows free interpretation of the British flag on one side, with the German flag on the other. The Icelandic flag ties them together. The yellow stars from the European flag are scattered liberally throughout.
